Social Grouping and Social Needs Of Infants		Provide all primates the natural social needs they requires based on their natural history or established zoo practices. If primate neonates require hand rearing, provide them social contact with con-specifics as soon as possible and introduce to a natural social group as soon as possible.	
Structure and Substrate		Provide all primates exhibit structures that allow them to physically behave and locomote in a natural way for their species. Substrates should be used to soften exhibits and/or provide natural nesting materials. This will encourage natural nest building behaviors.	
Foraging Behaviors		All Primates should be encouraged to use Natural foraging behaviors through all approved enrichment available.	
Manipulation		Primates should be given the opportunity to Use their physical manipulation skills on a daily basis.	
Intelligence/Mental Stimulation		Primates should be challenged mentally through approved enrichment to prevent boredom and otential stereotypic behaviors.	
Senses		Primate's senses should be considered based on the natural history of each species. Acuteness of sight, hearing, smell, and touch can vary in primate species and encouraged based on the species capacity.	

Key Behaviors to Encourage: Social, Locomotive, Nest Building, Foraging, Manipulation, Mental, and Senses.
