





New Task 7: Funding Roadmap

The outcome of this scope of work will be funding guidebook that outlines different agencies' approaches to quantifying benefits and a holistic catalog of CHEERS' benefits that can be leveraged for different funding scenarios over the course of the project.

- 1. BCA Methodology Matrix: Matrix of BCA methodologies applicability for CHEERS (FEMA, DOT, USACE, etc.)
- 2. CHEERS BCA: Develop an independent, agency-agnostic BCA methodology that encapsulates the full benefits of the CHEERS project. This assessment will not be tailored for a specific portion of the park or grant program. Rather, the output will quantify and articulate the benefits of the CHEERS project using best practices as a whole:
 - Direct benefits (port operations, damage/downtime to I-90, etc.)
 - 2. Indirect benefits
 - 3. Dredge placement alternatives "net negative" benefits
- 3. Alternatives Assessment: Provide value of the average losses for the do-nothing scenario.
- **4. Funding Roadmap Report:** Culmination of all funding related tasks in a combined, graphic report with supporting excel workbooks.

What is WEDG?

Waterfront Edge Design Guidelines

Resilience. Ecology. Access.

WEDG is a national rating system and set of guidelines to create resilient, ecological, and accessible waterfronts. Projects that achieve WEDG Verification are the gold standard for waterfront design.



- WEDG is a program of the Waterfront Alliance with a goal of maximizing the value of a site through resilience, ecology and access
- CHEERS is pursuing WEDG verification as a means to quantify best practices incorporated into the project design



> Ohio Lake Erie Commission Receives Multi-Million Dollar Award to Fund Projects in Underserved Communities Across Ohio's Lake Erie Watershed.

Ohio Lake Erie Commission (OLEC) has been selected as one of four recipients of the multi-million dollar Great Lakes Environmental Justice Grant Program awards, aimed at improving environmental outcomes in underserved and overburdened communities within the Great Lakes Basin. The award is part of the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative through the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency

OLEC will receive \$5.8 million to develop and implement the Lake Erie Environmental Justice Grant Program. This initiative will be carried out in collaboration with Black Environmental Leaders Association (BEL) and Rural Action (RA) to ensure that historically under-resourced communities, from urban centers to rural areas, have increased ability to access funding to protect and restore Lake Erie

"This grant enables OLEC and our partners—BEL and RA—to expand our reach and deepen our impact to ensure that underserved communities across Ohio's Lake Erie shoreline will be able to implement restoration and address water quality," said Joy Mulinex, Director of the Ohio Lake Erie Commission


implementation manager with the Great Lakes Protection Fund and holds adjunct and Associate Research professorships in the Departments of Biological Sciences and Earth








Analysis Background

This strategic approach builds off work Alan Neider (B&H Harvard Fellow) did in Summer 2023.

Taking queues from his work and refining the analytics, City Planning has incorporated a more complete neighborhood profile (including zoning, etc.) and expanded on Neider's previous forfeiture thinking.

The goal of this analysis is to call out specific addresses to hold and focus on for renovations, rehabs, and priority infill.






- Annual CSO Statistics
 - CSO-203 currently overflows 13 times per typical year,
 MG.
 - Once the Shoreline Storage Tunnel is online in 2026, overflow once per typical year, totaling 0.21 MG.
 - ODOT storm flow will still use the outfall pipe


CSO-203 Hydraulic Requirements

- Design Requirements
 - Convey 5-yr 6-hr storm = 221 MGD peak flow.
 - Assumed Lake Erie Water surface elevation of EL 573.8
 - Pipe sizing to consider Lake Erie water surface elevation of EL 574.35. Based on 2019 average Lake levels for top 8 storms (highest lake level based on NOAA data in last 100 years.
 - Capture floatables in CSO-202/203 cove area

CSO-203 Design and Construction Schedule

- Schedule Estimate (Pending Sailing Facility Improvements)
 - January 2026 Release RFP (4 months to procure designer)
 - April 2026 Design NTP
 - May 2027 Final Design / Bid Advertise (1 year design period)
 - August 2027 Award Construction (4 months to bid)
 - September 2027 Construction NTP (1 year construction period)
 - Majority of construction activity to be completed during boating off season
 - October 2028 Construction Substantial Completion
